### ***Its been a while .....***

*As I type this column the Parliament has broken for the holiday season with uncertainties about the future of the revised HE reforms bill just as strong as they were at budget time. If this new bill was to be passed in the Senate early next year, this would clear the path to full fee deregulation in the Australian HE sector from 2016 and represent one of the most significant changes ever to be seen in the sector.*

*While Medical Deans welcome the proposed Medical Research Futures Fund and the extraordinary opportunity to sustainably fund medical research in Australia we know this proposal linked to a revised Medicare co payment as part of the revenue stream is problematic, and its passage through Senate in its new iteration is also uncertain. For those interested in the Government's policies in health it would appear the main game is still 'putting a price signal into Medicare' (L Tingle). The proposed changes to indexation and reduced rebates are certainly that!*

*On the local front Medical Deans repositions itself for a leaner few years whilst maintaining activities and advocacy that are relevant to both members and key external stakeholders.*

*The year has meant saying good-bye to good friends like Health Workforce Australia but welcoming new alliances with the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare, the Australian Health Practitioner Regulatory Agency and the Royal Australasian College of Surgeons just to name a few.*

### • MSOD dataset—the next phase

MSOD dataset has now over 30,000 participants and is evolving into a critical workforce planning tool.



Medical Deans will develop the next phase of the MSOD dataset. This next phase will include establishing processes for data linkage with AHPRA and the national health workforce dataset to track students from medical school, to PGY1, vocational training and beyond. Medical students in their final or penultimate year will continue to be recruited each year into the MSOD survey which will be delivered online but at their local medical school sites. AIHW will continue to be subcontracted to house and manage the dataset on our behalf and Medical Deans will commence a new form of reporting based on yearly aggregated and trend data and data linkage.

### • Assessment Quality Assurance opportunities for members

We will be writing to you soon to update you on an exciting [new collaboration with the Australian Medical Council](#) around sharing assessment items to assist in quality assurance activities and sharing expertise in clinical assessment and examiner training.
