

SPEAKERS



Katrina Anderson

Dr Katrina Anderson is Associate Professor, Academic Unit of General Practice, ANU Medical School and Medical Education Adviser, Canberra Region Medical Education Council. Katrina currently works clinically in refugee and asylum seeker health and has a variety of roles within the Medical School and ACT Health in training medical students and junior doctors. In 2017 she won a National Australian Award for University Teaching- Excellence in Education, Biological and Health Sciences for her vertically integrated GP curriculum. Her main research and education interests are in medical education specifically around the vertical integration of medical training, supervisor support and prevocational training of doctors. She has a special interest in mental health, counselling and self-care and is passionate about patient centred medicine and improving health outcomes for vulnerable and disadvantaged patients.



Jo Baxter

Joanne Baxter (Poutini Ngāi Tahu, Ngāti Apa ki te Rā Tō) is a Public Health Medicine Physician. She is Dean of the Dunedin School of Medicine / Te Kura Whaiora o Ōtepoti and Co-director of the Māori Health Workforce Development Unit. She has also been a member of the Ministry of Health's Health Workforce Advisory Board and the Te Whatu Ora, Health Workforce Taskforce. Joanne is recognised for her research on Māori mental health, ethnic health inequalities, indigenous medical education, and Māori health workforce development. Joanne has played a critical role in strategic Māori development within the Health Sciences Division including leading a team to dramatically increase the recruitment, retention, and achievement of Māori students in health sciences and health professional programmes.



Shirley Bowen

Shirley is the Chief Executive of the North Metropolitan Health Service. Shirley has a deep and enduring commitment to providing excellent patient care, staff wellbeing and safety, research and innovation. She places great priority on establishing innovative strategies and implementing best practise to provide high quality health services. With dual Fellowships in Infectious Diseases (FRACP) and Sexual Health Medicine (FACHSHM), Shirley has gathered a wealth of knowledge working in clinical medicine, executive leadership, research, and academia. Shirley has extensive experience working in public and private hospitals. Previously her roles included CEO of St John of God Subiaco, Dean of the School of Medicine at the University of Notre Dame and Chief Health Officer for the ACT. Shirley is passionate about authentic leadership and person-centred care.



Meredith del Pilar-Labarda

Dr. Meredith del Pilar-Labarda is a Professor and the former Chairperson of the Department of Medicine at the University of the Philippines Manila School of Health Sciences. Currently, she is the coordinator and chairperson of the Research Unit and is an active member of the Eastern Visayas Health Research and Development Consortium in the region. She is also the lead for Social Innovation in Health Initiative (SIHI) Global Network Secretariat, a global network of passionate individuals, organizations and institutions advocating for social innovation in health and advancing research in social innovation, as well as the lead for SIHI Philippines Hub. She is also a Doctor of Social Development and the school's lead coordinator for health leadership and governance programs in partnership with government and non-government organizations in co-designing training modules, providing capacity building trainings and coaching for local chief executives, municipal health officers and other important stakeholders in the local health system and community.



Kahla Edwards

Dr Kahla Edwards is an Intern at St John of God Midland Public and Private Hospital in WA. She graduated with Distinction from Curtin Medical School in 2022, as the recipient of the Australia Medical Association (WA) 'Hippo' award and Sir Charles Gairdner Hospital Prize for Excellence in Clinical Skills. Prior to starting her journey into medicine, Kahla was an intensive care nurse with postgraduate clinical nursing certification. She has a passion for critical care medicine and education, also working as an Advanced Life Support 1 Instructor and recently being appointed to a sessional academic role at Curtin Medical School.



Kirsty Forrest

Professor Kirsty Forrest is the Dean of Medicine at Bond University, a medical education leader, teacher, researcher, and clinician whose career has spanned the United Kingdom and Australia. Kirsty is frequently invited as a facilitator and speaker on education and leadership at national and international forums. She has been involved in medical education research for over 15 years, and her research has been translated through co-authoring and editing several best-selling medical textbooks including 'Understanding Medical Education: Evidence, Theory and Practice' and 'Healthcare Simulation at a Glance'. Kirsty's passion for medical education extends into the graduate forum through her roles as member of the Education, Development and Evaluation Committee and a lead facilitator for the educator program of the Australian and New Zealand College of Anaesthetists (ANZCA). She works clinically as a Consultant Anaesthetist at Gold Coast University Hospital and is a Fellow of the ANZCA. Kirsty's clinical research areas include medical leadership education and patient safety.



Daniel Hunt

Dr Daniel Hunt is a Jaru and Yindjibarndi man and is the Deputy Medical Director of Derbarl Yerrigan Health Service. Daniel is the Clinical Lead for the Social, Emotional and Wellbeing Team and Clinical Lead for Syphilis/STI/BBV team at Derbarl Yerrigan. Additionally he has roles including Co-Chair of the WA Metropolitan Syphilis Outbreak Response Team, member of the leadership group for the First Nations Point of Care Testing group, is on the NACCHO guidelines advisory group for HTLV-1, and sits on several other committees and boards. Daniel has significant involvement with Clinical Governance and Quality Improvement at Derbarl Yerrigan Health Services and has previously served as a Dentist at Derbarl. In. In 2022 Daniel was RACGP GP Registrar of the Year for Western Australia.



Zsuzsoka Kecskes

Zsuzsoka moved to Sydney in 1994 and completed her training in Neonatology in Brisbane, where she also completed a PhD at the University of Queensland. She worked as a Neonatologist in Canberra from 2001 to 2022 and has been the Director of the Department from 2007 to 2015. She was recognised by the Australia Day Council who awarded her as the ACT Australian of the Year 2014 for her work with families to design a safe, family-centred Neonatal Intensive Care Unit and the implementation of the NICUcam, a web-based design for parents and families to view their baby when they are not able to visit. From March 2020 Zsuzsoka was the Dean of the ANU Medical School, a time when the COVID pandemic greatly affected world health and higher education. She became Dean of the Graduate School of Medicine at the University of Wollongong in August 2022.



Michelle Leech AM

Recipient of Member of the Order of Australia (AM) 2023, Professor Michelle Leech is Head of the Medical Course Monash University and Deputy Dean at the Faculty of Medicine, Nursing and Health Sciences. Michelle is the Head of the Rheumatoid Arthritis Clinic at Monash Health. Michelle has been the chair of the Clinical Examination Committee of the RACP National Exam Panel of the College of Physicians. She is the President of MDANZ, Chair of the Board of the PMCV and Chair of the Medication Safety and Therapeutics Committee at Monash Health.

Michelle has held many teaching roles in Medicine at Monash Health including Director of Physician Training as well as teaching roles at Monash University. She has received a number of teaching awards including the Australian Medical Students Association National Teaching award in 2014. She was the recipient of Health Workforce Australia funding to develop Health Science Interprofessional Learning (IPL) opportunities across disciplines at Monash University and Monash Health.



Lewis MacKinnon

Dr Lewis MacKinnon, a well-known Perth-based GP, hails from Scotland and serves as the Clinical Dean for General Practice at Curtin Medical School. Prior to moving to Australia in 2015, he provided vital care on Scotland's scenic isle of Islay and proudly served as a captain in the British Army's Royal Army Medical Corps.

Founder of the award-winning GP clinic Skye Medical Armadale, Dr MacKinnon is deeply committed to medical education in Western Australia, fostering the growth of future doctors as a Senior medical educator with the RACGP and championing sexual health discussions among Perth clinicians through his Sexual Health education network, SHIPS. More recently, he joined the Board of North Metropolitan Health Service, supporting the provision of world-leading healthcare in Western Australia.

Nationally recognised as a heart failure and infectious diseases speaker, he is also an influential member of the Australian HIV antiretroviral guidelines committee. His excellence was celebrated with the RACGP WA GP of the Year award in 2019, and he continues to lead as the WA RACGP Faculty Deputy Chair and senior IMG representative for DHASWA (Doctors Health Advisory Service WA).



Graeme Maguire

Adjunct Professor Graeme Maguire is the Director of Medical Education for WA Country Health Service (WACHS). WACHS is a provider of health services across 2.5 million sq km of regional Western Australia and includes six large regional health campuses, 15 district health campuses, 46 small hospitals, and 43 health centres and nursing posts. The WACHS Medical Education Unit supports pre-vocational (interns and RMOs) and vocational doctors and training pathways as well as the training needs of GP and non-GP specialists in regional WA. Graeme was previously the Deputy Dean of Medicine at Curtin University, head of General Internal Medicine at Western Health, Melbourne and a Divisional Director at the Baker Heart and Diabetes Institute in Melbourne and Alice Springs. He has lived and worked as a general and respiratory physician and researcher across regional Australia and continues to provide remote physician outreach services whenever he can. He is also the President of the Adult Medicine Division of the Royal Australasian College of Physicians and Chair of the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare's expert advisory group on asthma and other chronic respiratory conditions. His research interests relate to health services research and the health and health care needs of vulnerable populations and residents of rural and resource poor settings.



William May

Dr. William May is the Dean of the College of Medicine Nursing & Health Sciences since 2017 to date. Acted in the role of Deputy Vice-Chancellor of the Fiji National University and was appointed to be Acting Vice-Chancellor in 2020, 2021, and 2022. All these three-year blocks of appointments totalled fifteen months in duration.

From 2007-2008 he was working as a Senior Cardiology Fellow at the Christchurch Public Hospital in New Zealand funded by WHO. He is a Consultant Physician by background and a member of the Fiji Medical & Dental Councils. He is the immediate ex-chairman of the Board of Management of the Fiji Medical and Dental Council, a Board Member of the Western Pacific Association of Medical Educators (WPAME) and a Fiji Higher Education Commission Research Committee Reference Member.



Brendan Murphy AC

Professor Brendan Murphy AC was Secretary of the Department of Health from 13 July 2020 until 6th July 2023. Prior to his appointment as Secretary, he was the Chief Medical Officer for the Australian Government and prior to this, the Chief Executive Officer of Austin Health in Victoria. Professor Murphy is:

- a Professorial Associate with the title of Professor at the University of Melbourne
- an Adjunct Professor at Monash University and at the Australian National University
- a Fellow of the Australian Academy of Health and Medical Sciences
- a Fellow of the Royal Australian College of Physicians
- a Fellow of the Australian Institute of Company Directors.

He was formerly CMO and director of Nephrology at St Vincent's Health, and sat on the Boards of the Centenary Institute, Health Workforce Australia, the Florey Institute of Neuroscience and Mental Health, the Olivia Newton-John Cancer Research Institute and the Victorian Comprehensive Cancer Centre. He is also a former president of the Australian and New Zealand Society of Nephrology.



Richard Murray

Professor Richard Murray is the Dean of Medicine and Dentistry at James Cook University, and immediate past President of Medical Deans Australia and New Zealand.

His career focus has been in rural and remote medicine, Aboriginal health, public health, tropical medicine, medical and health professional education and the healthcare needs of underserved populations. He has a national and international profile in rural medical education and rural medicine and has held a range of leadership positions.

Professor Murray is also a Director on the Board of the Mackay Hospital and Health Service and is a past President of the Australian College of Rural and Remote Medicine.

Prior to joining JCU as Planning Director of the Rural Clinical School in 2005, Professor Murray spent 14 years in the remote Kimberley region of Western Australia, including 12 years as the Medical Director of the Kimberley Aboriginal Medical Services Council, a position in which he had broad-ranging clinical, population health, teaching, research and medical leadership and management roles.



John Olynyk

John is Associate Dean and Head of the Medical Discipline at Curtin University and has a strong interest in teaching and mentoring medical trainees. He is a Gastroenterologist & Hepatologist with over 30 years' experience, primarily at The Fiona Stanley Fremantle Hospital Group where he was Head and of Gastroenterology from 2010 until July 2020. John led the Gastroenterology & Hepatology Transition FSH and the implementation of state-wide and national pathways for clinical care. John has extensive publications for research in the field of liver disease, focusing predominantly on basic and clinical research in iron overload disorders and the pathogenesis of chronic liver injury and cancer. More recently, John has been awarded the West Australian "Curtinovation" award in 2021 for discovery of a new predictive genomic biomarker panel for future liver cancer, and Fellowship of the Gastroenterology Society of Australia in 2022.



Simone Raye

Dr Simone Raye is a proud Bardi Jabbir Jabbir woman from the Kimberley. Simone studied at Newcastle University then went on to work at the Royal Darwin Hospital for many years and then specialised in General Practice.

Simone has a practice located in Marrara in the Northern Territory. Dr Raye is an Aboriginal Health Training Medical Educator and is involved in cultural education and direction including GP registrar medical cultural education.

Simone was closely involved with the initial meetings that led to the formation of AIDA and is currently the AIDA President



Shahmir Rind

Shahmir Rind is a Badimaya Yamatji man of the Martin family, from Mt Magnet in WA. He has been raised on Whadjuk country and is currently in his final year of Medicine at Curtin University. Shahmir is passionate about Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander education and health. He hopes to practice as a psychiatrist in the future with a special interest in child & adolescent mental health, and forensic psychiatry.



Vivek Velaga

Vivek is a 3rd year student at the Curtin Medical School. He is currently serving as the President of the Curtin Association of Medical Students where he has enjoyed working with his team to foster a warm and welcoming culture within the student body, and in the school as a whole. Prior to medicine Vivek was working in Melbourne as a physiotherapist specialising in the cervical spine, headaches, and the temporomandibular joint. It was here that he quickly discovered a passion for working with patients and helping them address all aspects of their wellbeing to ensure a happy and healthy life – this love for holistic care has since led to a deep and emerging interest in palliative medicine. He also has a keen interest in teaching and medical education.
